As I write this piece on a sunny, beautifully autumnal Sunday afternoon, a half-remembered line tugs at the edge of my memory. Google (other search engines, or people with better memories than mine, are available!) comes to my rescue and I have it! "The past is a foreign country: they do things differently there". It's the opening line of *The Go-Between* by LP Hartley. I'm not sure whether or not I've read the book, but this line is very familiar to me. According to the internet, I'm far from the only person who has this sentence lurking in their memory, and I'm sure that this is because it expresses something which seems to ring true.

Often, when speaking about Bible stories, I'm aware that many of us do consign them to a past in which things were done differently and which we may think has little to nothing to do with us and our lives in the here and now.

But if we really engage with the scriptures, with the men, women and children who play key roles or peripheral parts in the various grand dramas or vignettes described for us in the pages of the Bible, we might begin to see the similarities of personality, character and emotion we share with those people of the past. And we see consistency in God's relationship with us - the condemnation of behaviours which result in injustice, oppression and harm. The call to love and to show that love in our words, our thoughts and our actions.

The ability to empathise, to feel with and "to walk in someone else's shoes" is key to understanding those who have gone before us, but also people of our own time. It would be a dull world if we didn't do things differently from each other, but it would be a very lonely and even dangerous world if we were to allow ourselves to be separated one from the other because of that.

Throughout the scriptures we see how God has created us in wonderful diversity, each with our own unique combination of gifts, personalities and abilities. He encourages us to build relationships with each other and with Him, to come together in ways which are mutually beneficial, strengthening and inspiring, and to show his love to the whole world.

May all our lives be blessed, in their differences and in their similarities!


DUNLOP GALLERY CHRISTMAS SHOW
